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this book illuminates our understanding of what happens when different cultures meet twelve cultural historians explore the mechanism and inner dynamic of such encounters and demonstrate that while they often occur on the wave of global forces and influences they only acquire meaning locally where culture inherently resides

the trade between peoples of different cultures from the ancient world to the commercial revolution

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cross cultural encounters in modern world history explores cultural contact as an agent of change it takes an encounters approach to world history since 1500 rather than a political one to reveal different perspectives and experiences as well as key patterns and transformations it studies the spaces between cultures historically to help us transcend human differences today in a rapidly globalizing world the text focuses on first encounters that suggest long term developments and particularly significant encounters that have changed the direction of world history because of the complexities of these encounters the author takes a user friendly approach to keep the text accessible to students with varying backgrounds in history

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introduces readers to the cross cultural study of ancient and classical civilizations the book is divided into two sections the first examining the ongoing interaction between ancient agrarian and nomadic societies and the second focusing on regional patterns in the dissemination of ideas

exploration of east west cultural exchanges and interactions the chapters are arranged in chronological and thematic order and encompass the cutting edge research of a diverse group of international scholars the subjects range from archaeology art history and photography to conservation sociology and cultural studies with cross disciplinary examples of classical modern and contemporary periods the book seeks to inspire new ideas and stimulate further scholarly debate on the convergence dissimilarities and mutual influences of the visual arts and material culture of asia the middle east europe and the united states the volume will be of interest to scholars and students working in the fields of art and cultural history as well as intercultural studies it will be equally useful to collectors artists and curators of global art and world cultures

analyzes indian cultural histories written between 1870 and the present focuses on english language texts by bengali historians on the subject of literature and culture and compares indian writing on cultural heritage to the dominant forms of european historiography prevalent during the colonial period

change is the stock in trade of historians if we have no concept of change and no sense of the past as different from the present then consequently we cannot have an historical sense in the deepest meaning of the term however historians rarely discuss change per se in very explicit terms what constitutes change how do you know when change has happened how do you define or measure it are there different kinds of change these are some of the issues explored in this book ireland has been in a process of extremely rapid cultural change in recent decades whether in the precipitate decline in the influence of the catholic church or in the rapid adoption of globalised market culture reflecting on the general nature of such change is a prerequisite for understanding ireland s place in a new cultural economy this collection is based on papers presented to the 25th biennial irish conference of historians held at the national university of ireland galway may 2001

this book has been defined around three important issues the first sheds light on how people in various philosophical religious and political contexts understand the natural environment and how the relationship between the environment and the body is perceived the second focuses on the perceptions that a particular natural environment is good or bad for human health and examines the reasons behind such characterizations the

third examines the promotion in history of specific practices to take advantage of the health benefits or avoid the harm caused by certain environments and also efforts made to change environments supposed to be harmful to human health the feeling and or the observation that the natural environment can have effects on human health have been and are still commonly shared throughout the world this led us to raise the issue of the links observed and believed to exist between human beings and the natural environment in a broad chronological and geographical framework in this investigation we bring the reader from ancient and late imperial china to the medieval arab world up to medieval modern and contemporary europe this book does not examine these relationships through the prism of the knowledge of our modern contemporary european experience which still too often leads to the feeling of totally different worlds rather it questions protagonists who in different times and in different places have reflected on their own terms on the links between environment and health and tries to obtain a better understanding of why these links took the form they did in these precise contexts this book targets an academic readership as well as an informed audience for whom present issues of environment and health can be nourished by the reflections of the past

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
